1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To provide information to the Policy and Regulatory Subcommittee (“the Committee”) to enable the Committee to hear the objection to a dangerous classification imposed on the dog (“Taizan”) owned by Xiangyan Wang (“Ms Wang”).

2. Executive summary

Whakaraapopototanga matua

Section 31 (1)(b) of the Dog Control Act 1996 (“the Act”) allows Waikato District Council (“Council”) to classify a dog as dangerous if Council has on the basis of sworn evidence, reasonable grounds to believe that a dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife. Section 31(3) of the Act provides that if a dog is classified dangerous the owner may within 14 days of receiving notice of the classification, object in writing in regard to the classification (Section 31 of the Act annexed as Appendix 1).

Taizan, a black and tan Mastiff x Husky x German Shepard, aged approximately 10 months old (at 31 December 2022) and owned by Ms Wang attacked a Terrier Jack Russell (“Brian”) being walked by his owner Ms Sarah McCreath (“Ms McCreath”) on 31 December 2022.

The attack occurred near XX Chardonnay Way (“the Property”). As a response to the attack Animal Control attended the Property on 1 January 2023 and seized Taizan (Service Request annexed as Appendix 2).

After investigation, Council advised Ms Wang of the decision to classify Taizan as dangerous (Notice of Classification annexed as Appendix 3).

In accordance with section 31(3) of the Act, Ms Wang formally objected in writing to the dangerous classification within the statutory time frame (Objection to Classification annexed as Appendix 4).

Council considers that Taizan poses an ongoing threat to persons or animals given the reported behaviour, in relation to both the initial incident and the behaviour displayed whilst Council attended the Property.

Council submits that for public safety reasons Taizan should remain classified as dangerous, requiring the dog to be muzzled when in public and contained to a securely fenced portion of the Property that does not include access to the front door.

3. Staff recommendations Tuutohu-aa-kaimahi

That the Policy and Regulatory Subcommittee:

- a. receives the report; and
- b. confirms that the dangerous dog classification for Taizan (Dog ID 160864) owned by Ms Xiangyan Wang (Name ID: 184301) be upheld under section 31(1)(b) of the Dog Control Act 1996.

4. Background Koorero whaimaarama

On 31 December 2022 afterhours received a complaint from Ms McCreath describing the attack on her dog, Brian. Afterhours recorded this into the Service Request. Animal Control was tasked the Service Request and Animal Control Officer Amanda Davis ("ACO Davis") responded.

ACO Davis checked the dog history prior to attending the residence of Ms Wang. (Dog details annexed as Appendix 5).

ACO Davis and Animal Control Officer Adrienne Prentis-Pirere ("ACO Prentis – Pirere") attended the Property and spoke with Ms Wang and her partner ("Mr Papuni"). Officer Davis confirmed with Ms Wang and Mr Papuni that the attack occurred. (Pocketbook notes - Redacted annexed as Appendix 6).

ACO Davis explained Council process for responding to an attack and that Taizan would be seized. ACO Davis also advised Ms Wang and Mr Papuni that Taizan was not registered.

ACO Davis noticed Mr Papuni physically struggled to control and handle Taizan when asked to place the dog into the vehicle.

ACO Davis advised of possible enforcement outcomes being a classification and/or prosecution and handed Ms Wang the notice of seizure. (Notice of Seizure annexed as Appendix 7).

On 5 January 2023 ACO Davis attended the residence of Ms McCreath to take her statement (Statement contained in Annexure A of Appendix 8) . Ms McCreath advises in her statement as she was walking Brian near the residence of Ms Wang, she noticed Ms Wang and Taizan walking toward them.

Ms McCreath noticed Taizan was on a very skinny lead. Ms McCreath pulled Brian back to her and went to cross the road when Taizan noticed Brian. Ms McCreath advises that she noticed Taizan displaying aggressive behaviour (puffed up and looked bigger) before suddenly running straight for Brian.

Ms McCreath informs that Ms Wang had no control of Taizan and let go of the lead. Ms McCreath states she was in the middle of the road when Taizan made contact at the back of Brian's neck and violently shook him while growling.

Ms McCreath advised that she noticed Ms Wang just standing there not saying anything or making advances to try and stop Taizan.

Ms McCreath grabbed part of Taizan's lead which had wrapped around her and tried to free Brian. Ms McCreath states that Taizan then released Brian after she applied force.

Taizan made second contact with Brian on the left backside, picked him up and shook him without making sound. Ms McCreath was then able to grab Brian and lift him into her arms, at this time Taizan released Brian and attempted to attack again whilst Ms McCreath was holding him.

Ms McCreath used force and kicked Taizan to stop him from continuing his attack. Ms Wang then came to pick up the loose lead and Mr Papuni came from around the corner.

Ms McCreath advises Ms Wang said "Ok Ok" though neither of Taizan's owners spoke to her and attempted to leave without acknowledgement. Ms McCreath told Ms Wang, should Brian need vet care she expects them to pay. Mr Papuni told her to "Fuck off". As they walked away Taizan was trying to come back to get Brian, he was pulling Ms Wang back and jumping around.

Ms McCreath examined Brian before continuing home ensuring she avoided the residence of Ms Wang and Mr Papuni. Ms McCreath states she took Brian to the afterhours vet upon noticing the way he was sore on his back leg and seeing broken skin.

Ms McCreath informed ACO Davis that Brian needed medical treatment for his wounds and stitches on his right side. This was obtained at Waikato Afterhours Vet Hospital on 31/12/2022. (Included in Appendix 8 – Affidavit of Sarah McCreath).

Ms McCreath returned to the vet for follow up on 5 January 2023, she advised that Brian may need further diagnostics such as x-rays of neck and pelvis if there was no improvement. (Included in Appendix 8 – Affidavit of Sarah McCreath).

Ms McCreath spoke of her shock and continued hesitance walking Brian around big dogs now and how the attack has affected her trust in letting Brian socialise with big dogs even though Brian is a friendly dog. (Affidavit of Sarah McCreath annexed as Appendix 8).

On 22 January 2023 ACO Davis presented the file to the Team Leader of Animal Control, Tracey Oakes ("Ms Oakes"), who holds delegation for imposing dangerous classifications in accordance with section 31 of the Act.

Following review of the evidence and consideration of possible enforcement options, Ms Oakes made the decision to classify Taizan as dangerous in accordance with section 31 of the Act.

The factors considered by Ms Oakes included the aggressiveness of Taizan's behaviour towards Brian, the number of times contact was made and re-attempted and Taizan's behaviour when the Animal Control Officers were on the Property. Ms Oakes also took into account Ms Wang's apparent lack of understanding of what her dog is capable of.

A dangerous classification ensures that Taizan is muzzled in public which ensures the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife. A dangerous classification also ensures that Taizan is contained to a securely fenced portion of the property that does not include access to the front door.

5. Discussion and analysis

Taataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

Section 31(4) of the Act (Appendix 1) provides that in determining this objection the Committee shall have regard to:

- a. the evidence which formed the basis for the original classification; and
- b. any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons or animals; and
- c. the matters relied on in support of the objection; and
- d. any other relevant matters.

As a result of this analysis, the Committee will have the following options:

- a. Uphold the classification of the dog as dangerous; or
- b. Rescind the classification.

The Committee must give written notice of its decision and the reasons for it, under section 31(5) of the Act to the objector.

Staff recommend option A, and the reasons for this recommendation are discussed below.

5.1 Options

Ngaa koowhiringa

Staff recommend option A because:

- The Act states that the territorial authority must classify a dog as dangerous if the territorial authority has on the basis of sworn evidence, reasonable grounds to believe that a dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.
 - Taizan was involved in an incident where he showed aggression in a sustained attack on another dog, leading to Ms McCreath having to take forceful action to stop the attack. This leads Council to believe Taizan may pose a threat to any person or domestic pet.
-

- Taizan was approximately 10 months old at the time of the incident. Behaviour such as the aggression shown by Taizan is very concerning in a dog of this age. This indicates the behaviour is likely to escalate as he gets older without serious and committed behaviour modification and physical controls put in place to prevent a reoccurrence of this type of offending. A dangerous classification ensures physical controls (muzzling) to mitigate this behaviour are in place.
- The desexing enforcement may help with Taizan's behaviour as he gets older. It will prevent Taizan's genetic traits being passed on to further puppies. Aggressive behaviour can be passed on through breeding.
- Ms Wang does not appear to realise the seriousness of this offending from Taizan. At no stage has she taken responsibility for Taizan's actions.
- On checking Council database 30/07/2023, Taizan has not been registered for the new registration year (23/24).
- Ms Wang's objection to the classification does not indicate in any way how she intends to mitigate Taizan's behaviour or further offending against the Act.
- A dangerous classification ensures that:
 - Taizan is muzzled when in public to help mitigate the threat the dog poses; and
 - Taizan is kept in a securely fenced portion of his property that allows access to the front door, minimising the risk of Taizan getting loose unintentionally; and
 - Taizan will be desexed; and
 - Council can take stronger enforcement action if this behaviour repeats.

5.2 Financial considerations

Whaiwhakaaro puutea

There are no material financial considerations associated with the recommendations of this report.

5.3 Legal considerations

Whaiwhakaaro-aa-ture

Staff confirm that the staff recommendation complies with the Council's legal and policy requirements. Legal Counsel will be available to assist the Committee with the matters of law as required.

5.4 Strategy and policy considerations

Whaiwhakaaro whakamaaherehere kaupapa here

The report and recommendations are consistent with the Council's policies, plans and prior decisions.

5.5 Maaori and cultural considerations **Whaiwhakaaro Maaori me oona tikanga**

There are no wider Maaori or cultural considerations involved in the exercise of Council's legislative responsibilities under the Act.

5.6 Climate response and resilience considerations **Whaiwhakaaro-aa-taiao**

The matters in this report have no known impact on climate change or resilience for the Council.

5.7 Risks **Tuuraru**

Should the Committee proceed with the staff recommendation and uphold the dangerous classification, the classification stands. The objector has no further rights of appeal.

Should the Committee rescind the classification, there is a risk that further breaches of the Act will occur, and members of the public, domestic pets, stock or protected wildlife could be further threatened or even harmed.

6. Significance and engagement assessment **Aromatawai paahekoheko**

6.1 Significance **Te Hiranga**

The decisions and matters of this report are assessed as of low significance, in accordance with the Council's [Significance and Engagement Policy](#).

6.2 Engagement **Te Whakatuutakitaki**

This is a regulatory/operational matter concerning an individual and we do not propose to inform more broadly than necessary to give effect to the classification, if upheld.

7. Next steps **Ahu whakamua**

Should the classification be upheld, it will apply at a national level.

Council's role will be to update the relevant records and enforce the requirements of the classification.

Section 31 of the Act



*Dangerous dogs***31 Territorial authority to classify dangerous dogs**

- (1) A territorial authority must classify a dog as a dangerous dog if—
- (a) the owner of the dog has been convicted of an offence in relation to the dog under [section 57A\(2\)](#); or
 - (b) the territorial authority has, on the basis of sworn evidence attesting to aggressive behaviour by the dog on 1 or more occasions, reasonable grounds to believe that the dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife; or
 - (c) the owner of the dog admits in writing that the dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.
- (2) Where any dog is classified as a dangerous dog under subsection (1), the territorial authority shall immediately give notice in the prescribed form of that classification to the owner.
- (3) Where any dog is classified as a dangerous dog under subsection (1)(b), the owner may, within 14 days of the receipt of notice of that classification under subsection (2), object to the classification in writing to the territorial authority, and shall be entitled to be heard in support of his or her objection.
- (4) In considering any objection under this section, the territorial authority shall have regard to—
- (a) the evidence which formed the basis for the original classification; and
 - (b) any steps taken by the owner to prevent any threat to the safety of persons and animals; and
 - (c) the matters advanced in support of the objection; and
 - (d) any other relevant matters—
- and may uphold or rescind the classification.
- (5) The territorial authority shall give notice of its decision on any objection, and the reasons for its decision, to the owner as soon as practicable.

- You have been convicted of an offence under section 57A(2) of the Dog Control Act.
- The Waikato District Council has, on the basis of sworn evidence attesting to aggressive behaviour by the dog on one or more occasions, reasonable grounds to believe it constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.
- You have admitted in writing that the dog constitutes a threat to the safety of any person, stock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife.

A summary of the effect of the classification and your right to object is contained overleaf.

*For the purposes of the Dog Control Act 1996, you are the owner of a dog if-

- you own the dog
- you have the dog in your possession (otherwise than for a period not exceeding 72 hours for the purpose of preventing the dog causing injury, or damage, or distress, or for the sole purpose of restoring a lost dog to its owner): or
- you are the parent or guardian of a person under 16 who is the owner of the dog and who is a member of your household living with and dependant on you

Effect of classification as dangerous dog
Sections 32 and 36A, Dog Control Act 1996

You are required,—

- (a) within 1 month after receipt of this notice, to ensure that the dog is kept within a securely fenced portion of your property that it is not necessary to enter to obtain access to at least 1 door of any dwelling on the property; and
- (b) not to allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without—
 - (i) the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction; and
 - (ii) the dog being controlled on a leash (except in a designated dog exercise area); and
- (c) to produce to Waikato District Council, within 1 month after receipt of this notice, a certificate issued by a veterinarian certifying—
 - (i) that the dog is or has been neutered; or
 - (ii) that for reasons that are specified in the certificate, the dog will not be in a fit condition to be neutered before a date specified in the certificate; and
- (d) where a certificate under paragraph (c)(ii) is produced to Waikato District Council, within 1 month after the date specified in that certificate, a further certificate under paragraph (c)(i); and
- (e) in respect of every registration year commencing after receipt of this notice, to pay dog control fees for that dog at 150% of the level that would apply if the dog were not classified as a dangerous dog; and
- (f) not to dispose of the dog to any other person without the written consent of the territorial authority in whose district the dog is to be kept.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (f) above. In addition, on conviction the court must order the destruction of the dog unless satisfied that the circumstances of the offence were exceptional and do not justify the destruction of the dog.

A dog control officer or dog ranger may seize and remove the dog from you if you fail to comply with all of the matters in paragraphs (a) to (f) above. The ranger or officer may keep the dog until you demonstrate that you are willing to comply with paragraphs (a) to (f).

You will also commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you sell or otherwise transfer the dog, or offer to do so, to any other person without disclosing that the dog is classified as a dangerous dog.

As from 1 July 2006, you are also required, for the purpose of providing permanent identification of the dog, to arrange for the dog to be implanted with a functioning microchip transponder. This must be confirmed by making the dog available to Waikato District Council in accordance with the reasonable instructions of Waikato District Council for verification that the dog has been implanted with a functioning microchip transponder of the prescribed type and in the prescribed location.

You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$3,000 if you fail to comply with this requirement—

- within 2 months from 1 July 2006 if your dog is classified as menacing on or after 1 December 2003 but before 1 July 2006; or
- within 2 months after the dog is classified as menacing if your dog is classified as menacing after 1 July 2006.

If the dog is in the possession of another person for a period not exceeding 72 hours, you must advise that person of the requirement to not allow the dog to be at large or in any public place or in any private way (other than when confined completely within a vehicle or cage) without the dog being muzzled in such a manner as to prevent the dog from biting but to allow it to breathe and drink without obstruction. You will commit an offence and be liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding \$500 if you fail to comply with this requirement.

Full details of the effect of classification as a dangerous dog are provided in the Dog Control Act 1996.

Right of objection to classification
Section 31(3), Dog Control Act 1996

You may object to the classification by lodging with the Waikato District Council a written objection within 14 days of receipt of this notice setting out the grounds on which you object. You are entitled to be heard in support of the objection and will be notified of the time and place at which your objection will be heard.
