- Construction at Ngaruawahia High School was ready for roading and Mr K Abbot was aware of this.
- It was noted that more street names could be added to the Ngaruawahia Roding Naming List and it was decided that this would be workshopped at a later time during the year in conjunction with the community.
- It was also noted that it was good to keep replenishing the list as time goes on to ensure consistency with the development process.

ACTION: A workshop to be organised with the Board and Roding Team for later on in 2023 to look at more street names for the Ngaruawahia approved list.

Chairpersons Report
Agenda Item 6.5

The chairperson provided a verbal report on the following items:

- So many blessings and positivity throughout Cyclone Gabrielle.
- Meetings had been attended and the Christmas break up with Taupiri Community Board was fun and great to attend.
- Future Local Government reform hui was attended through Zoom.
- Traffic Bylaw and Public Places: More proactiveness from the Board was required to ensure this bylaw is well responded to.

- The chairperson attended daily Civil Defence updates and wanted to acknowledge the teams in the Emergency Operating Centre. Feedback was provided around communications and more clarity required moving forward (i.e - access for staff to the Community Board Facebook page for more direct messaging straight to the community).
- Annual Plan Hui was attended – The Chairperson was getting an understanding of the process and where Ngaruawahia Community Board fit and how best to ensure projects are being completed.
- There was a lot going on for the Chairperson but is enjoying the mahi that was happening.
- Some work with Sam Toka had been done around Karakia and Te Ao Maori Kaupapa.
- Printed Agendas were appreciated and the Democracy Advisor would continue to print and leave at head office for pick up.

Councillor's Reports

Agenda Item 6.6

Verbal reports were received on the following items:

- Structure Plan for Ngaruawahia/Taupiri/Hopuhopu was ongoing and workshops were progressing.
- First Sustainability & Wellbeing committee meeting occurred this morning which was great to attend with some good discussion around economic development.
- Both Councillors had been extremely busy with multiple meetings and workshops attended over the last couple of weeks.
- Papakainga Housing work was being undertaken by Cr Turner, particularly around templates and the best way forward.
- There were two more meetings this week - Proposed District Plan and Council.
- Motorbikes – these were becoming a very frustrating issue for our community.
- First Whatawhata Community Hui two weeks ago took place and it was great to attend and get involved with the issues and concerns in that community.
- An acknowledgement was made to the Chairperson for the great meeting structure.
- Mana Whenua forums: Cr Turner advised she is making traction in this space and working with the Iwi & Community Partnerships Team. They were working on strategy and processes and getting a representative for each marae to make it consistent and open for all staff and marae.
- Tainui Games were attended by Cr Turner along with staff – it was a great engagement opportunity and a valuable insight into the communities thoughts around Council and engagement.

- Next step for Cr Turner with Mana Whenua Forums was to connect marae with the relevant council staff and to leave the operations side of things with staff to progress and complete.
- Both Councillors were trying to connect with all Community Committees to get a face into these areas – it was about reaching out to committees along with Community Boards.
- Cr Turner would continue attending Poukai to hear maori constituents voices. There was a discussion around safety for marae with the significant weather events and future planning around civil defence capabilities.
- A discussion around Turangawaewae Poukai and attending as a whole Board to make connections. This might not happen in 2023 but keep it on the schedule. A brief history of Poukai and their importance was provided to the Board by Cr Turner.

Community Board Members' Reports

Agenda Item 6.7

Verbal reports were received on the following items:

- A Zoom hui was attended around the Ngaruawahia/Taupiri/Hopuhopu Structure Plan - looking at starting community hui with each town from the 6-8 March with community members.
- Community Blueprint to be looked at during the next Ngaruawahia Community Board workshop.
- Community Safety – Police to be invited to either the next workshop or Community Board meeting.
- Waipa Tavern: Cr Patterson had an informal catch up with owner of the Tavern and a new timeline for removal has been decided by 1 April 2023. The owner did not reschedule from December so contractors are not available until April now. Cr Patterson would touch base with Contractors tomorrow to confirm timeline of removal of burnt structure. Concerns were raised around significant weather events in Ngaruawahia and what implications this might have on the safety of Ngaruawahia residents.
- Further concerns raised around Motorbike riders around town and the havoc this was creating for residents.
- Daffodil Day Planting – Council have been in touch to get this going by the end of April/early May (planting). Council would look at connecting with schools to take part in the planting and they are wanting to plant 4000 bulbs again.
- Housing stocks around New Zealand: Recent events highlight building that is happening and infrastructure to support the building. Good proactive work being done by Council getting out ahead of the cyclone to clear drains.
- Acknowledgement of Emergency Operating Centre and Council staff around Cyclone Gabrielle.

- There was good traffic flow on the Raglan diversion through Waingaro Road.
- A big Thank you to Ms Firth for organising the Christmas break up with Taupiri Community Board.
- Ngaruawahia Pools Community Event date: The board would look at pushing this to the end of March 2023 before the Pound Pool Pups event.
- Te Awa Cycleway opening at the end of March: All community groups have been asked to be involved in the day. A date for the event will be confirmed along with an outline as to what is happening on the day.
- Directional Signs for the Ngaruawahia Pools went up yesterday.

ACTION: The Board to arrange to invite Ngaruawahia Community Police or Community Constable to the next workshop or Board meeting to discuss community safety and in particular the Motorbike riders in town.

Additional Works & Issues Update from Community Led Development Advisor

Mrs L Van Den Bemd spoke to the Blueprint project and beautification of Ngaruawahia.

- Roller door project is being look at as well as other projects.
- The Board along with the Community Led Development Team can look at doing an exercise/workshop day with members of the community to look at different projects that can be done to beautify Ngaruawahia.
- Look at involving Citycare, Twin River Arts, The marae and other members of the community.
- There was a small budget from the Blueprint funds that could be used to kick-start the project.
- The art teacher at Ngaruawahia High was keen to work on the roller doors with students.
- Put out up to date messages to the community around Community Led Development.
- Community Led Development are keen to workshop this further with the board to nut out the details along with leaders in the community and sports clubs.
- The Waikato Bridge work by the Alliance Team has been delayed but could be a project that the board picks up especially if traffic management is already in place – could easily make a day of it.
- Look at scheduling a workshop for March after the Turangawaewae Poukai and Regatta.
- Te Mana o Te Rangi reserve: there were no concerns from Great South Road residents around the reserve.
- Food Bank & community involvement was going well.

ACTION: Community Led Development Advisor to work with the Board on the Blueprint Project and attend workshop which is scheduled for March.

- Internet link between Police and Ngaruawahia Community House: a quote has been provided to the Board by Cornerstone Security. Cr Patterson would liaise with Ms M May (Deputy General Manager – Service Delivery) to follow this up further. It would be picked up at the next meeting/workshop.

There being no further business the meeting was declared closed at 7.37PM.

A planning assessment by Potentialis consultants is complete and will provide a summary of options to ensure compliance of the new training lights with district and regional requirements.

Ngaruawahia Aquatic Centre

Development of a concept design for a pedestrian entrance off Market Street is continuing.

Panthers League Ground Carpark

A resource consent has been submitted to WDC through Gray Matter consultants.

BCD consultants are undertaking geotech, site survey, and service location and will then carry out detailed design.

2. Executive summary

Whakaraapopototanga matua

This report requests that the Ngaruawahia Community Board approve the attached proposed road name for this subdivision at 24 Jackson Street, Ngaruawahia. The name Tāpapa Lane has been proposed by the developer outside the pre-approved list. It is supported by the local hapuu Nga Uri o Tamainupo ki Whaingaroa Trust and by Council's roading team.

The name has been checked by Council staff against the Road Naming Policy.

4. Background

Koorero whaimaarama

SUB 0013/21 is a residential development on, more or less, 8253m² at 24 Jackson Street, Ngaruawahia. The development is consented to create 6 new lots situated on the southern side of Jackson Street in Ngaruawahia.

While a pre-approved list of names exists for the Ngaruawahia Community Board (attached), the developer is permitted to go outside of this list and propose different names. This is contemplated in the Road Naming Policy under section 1.2 as follows:

1.2 Request for Road Name not from the "Approved List" of Road Names

(a) Where an "Approved List" is not available or the subdivision developer wishes to choose their own road names, the developer shall make a request to Council's Roading Asset Team.

As required by the Road Naming Policy, the Developer has consulted with local hapuu Nga Uri o Tamainupo ki Whaingaroa Trust who chose this name. Tāpapa means Garden bed for kūmara plants. Due to its proximity to Pukeiāhua Pā, this area would have been covered in Kūmara gardens in the 1700s. Pukeiāhua Pā is an important site for Ngaruawahia, as it features in the story of how Ngaruawahia got its name.

Staff have reviewed the name and considered it does not duplicate, sound too similar, or is a duplicated street type (e.g. street, road, avenue, boulevard, junction, crescent, etc) which may otherwise cause travel uncertainties in the Waikato District. The names have been checked against Google mapping and NZ Post.

Hamilton City Council has confirmed that there is no similar sounding name within their District which would otherwise cause confusion. Staff note the only similar name is Tapapa Road in Tirau which is outside the LINZ addressing standards required distance.

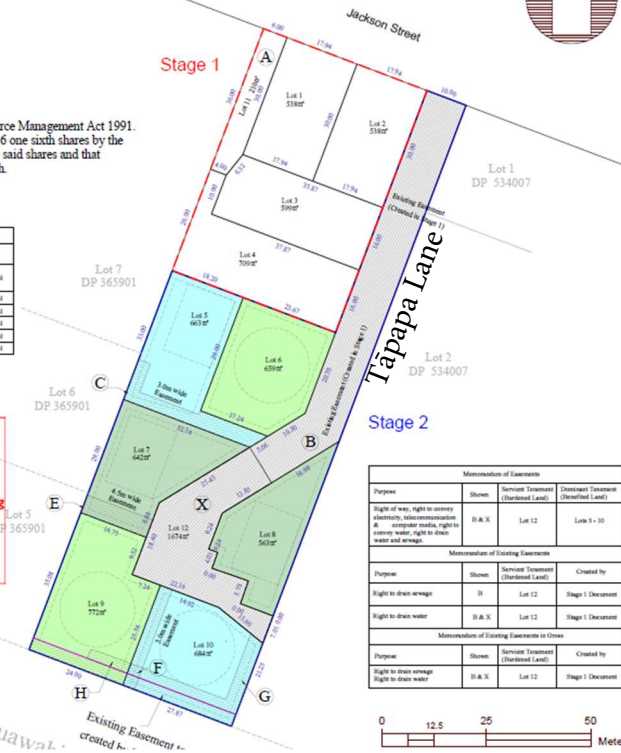

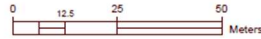

1. Purpose of the report

Te Take moo te puurongo

To inform the Board of the successful \$5.3M Infrastructure Acceleration Fund (IAF) Government grant funding to enable infrastructure and housing delivery in and around Festival Way in Ngaruawahia.

To introduce the Project Manager to the Board and to open the dialog between the staff team and the Board, including sharing concept plans for feedback and sharing a high-level programme for the works.

2. Executive summary

Whakaraapopotanga matua

Next Construction Limited (Next), a private development company managing significant landholdings in Ngaruawahia, has been successful in an application to the Government's Infrastructure Acceleration Fund (IAF).

The \$5.3M grant funding is to construct key enabling infrastructure around Festival Way. The bulk of the funding is for roading and stormwater infrastructure and will enable the development of over 200 houses.

The residentially zoned catchment currently faces infrastructure constraints, and is in fragmented ownership. Residential development would continue to be slow without local or central government assistance.

Council supported Next's application providing a letter of support and help with technical input into the funding application. The application as also supported by Taangata Whenua.

Kāinga Ora's commercial arm is administering the fund. The IAF requires a Funding Agreement between Council and Kāinga Ora. The Agreement obligates Council to deliver the infrastructure by certain milestone dates. There is also a Housing Outcomes Agreement between Council, Kāinga Ora and Next, to ensure delivery of houses by milestone dates and to deliver 20% of that stock below \$750,000.

Council has engaged Patrick Edwards from Development Partners Ltd to fill the role of project manager and also CKL consultants to progress design. The initial focus is Festival Way and Galbraith Street back towards Old Taupiri Road. Wider consideration is being given to the Old Taupiri Road / Great South Road intersection, an upgrade of which is also included in the funding package. Concept design options for Festival Way have been prepared and are attached to this report at Attachment 1.

The IAF funding is a capped funding bucket. If there are cost overruns they need to be funded by Council. It is Council's intention to utilise Development Agreements and Development Contributions to recover any overruns to avoid cost impacts on rate payers at large.

4. Background

Koorero whaimaarama

In June 2021, the Government announced the Infrastructure Acceleration Fund (IAF) initiative as part of the Housing Acceleration Fund. The \$1 bn IAF is administered by Kāinga Ora's commercial arm and aims to allocate funding to new or upgraded infrastructure to unlock housing developments in the short-to-medium term.

Next Construction Limited (Next), a private development company managing significant landholdings in Ngaruawahia, made an application to IAF to fund infrastructure in and around Festival Way. On 13 October 2022, Hon Dr Megan Woods announced that the Next application was successful.

The \$5.3M grant funding is to construct key enabling infrastructure, primarily roading and stormwater, and will enable the development of over 200 houses.

The IAF funding is to resolve the sub-catchment infrastructure constraints to enable the current development proposals to advance, and the development in the immediate term of substantially more land within the Festival Way catchment.

In addition, IAF will future proof further rezoning proposals through Medium Density Zoning (as per District Plan decisions) as well as adjoining Country Living Zone land to be considered for Residential Zoning in the future line with Waikato 2070.

Of the 200 dwellings the infrastructure enables, Next has committed to delivering at least 108. Of this, Next is committing to deliver at least 20% of those houses at a price point below the Government's First Home Grant House Price Cap for the area which is \$750,000.

The funding buckets are:

- Transport Projects \$3,561,000
- Three Waters Projects \$1,759,000
- NZTA subsidy for Festival Way and rail crossing safety improvements \$1,020,000
- Total funding \$6,340,000 (\$5.3M from IAF).

The IAF funding is for the following projects:

- Construction of Festival Way road to urban standards, including car parking
- Improvements and alterations to Galbraith Street to improve intersection and rail crossing safety
- Stormwater conveyance and treatment for Festival Way
- Stormwater conveyance for the development land
- Shared path along Festival Way and Galbraith Street to the rail crossing
- Rail pedestrian crossing rail upgrades
- Significant upgrade of the Old Taupiri Road and Great South Road intersection
- Completion of potable watermain 'loop' along Festival Way
- Upsizing a wastewater pump station to increase pumping capacity

Attached to this report as Attachment 1 is a schematic highlighting the IAF related projects.

5. Discussion and analysis

Taataritanga me ngaa tohutohu

Most of the projects are set to be delivered by December 2024 with some final road works through to March 2025.

Council has engaged consultants to progress design primarily for Festival Way and Galbraith back towards Old Taupiri Road. Concept Design options for Festival Way are included in this report at Attachment 2.

Wider consideration is being given to the Old Taupiri Road / Great South Road intersection, as part of the Ngaruawahia Structure Plan. That intersection is also included in the fund.

Conversations with Taangata Whenua are ongoing with Turangawaewae Marae, Ngaati Tamainupoo and Waikato-Tainui. WDC has engaged Te Huia Natural Resource Limited to assist with this aspect of the project, and this is building on the engagement that Next has had regarding the catchment and the IAF application.

6. Next steps

Ahu whakamua

Council's project manager will provide feedback from Next, Taangata Whenua, and the Board, alongside technical feedback, to the consultant designers to progress the design process.

The project manager is aware of the request from the Board to establish some signage in the area to communicate with the wider community about what is happening. Once initial design options have been reviewed and agreed by all parties, an information board will be erected in the area to inform the community.

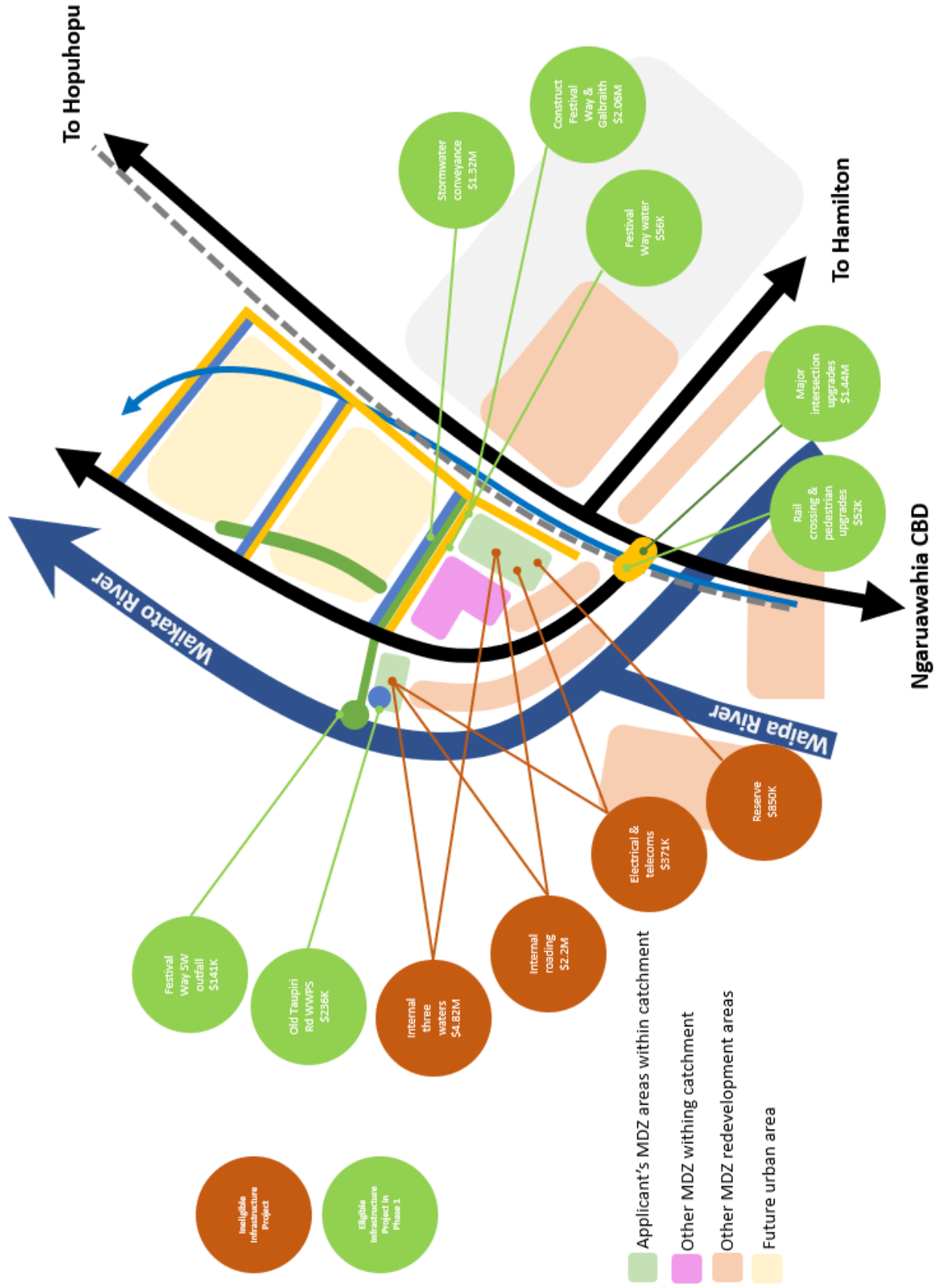

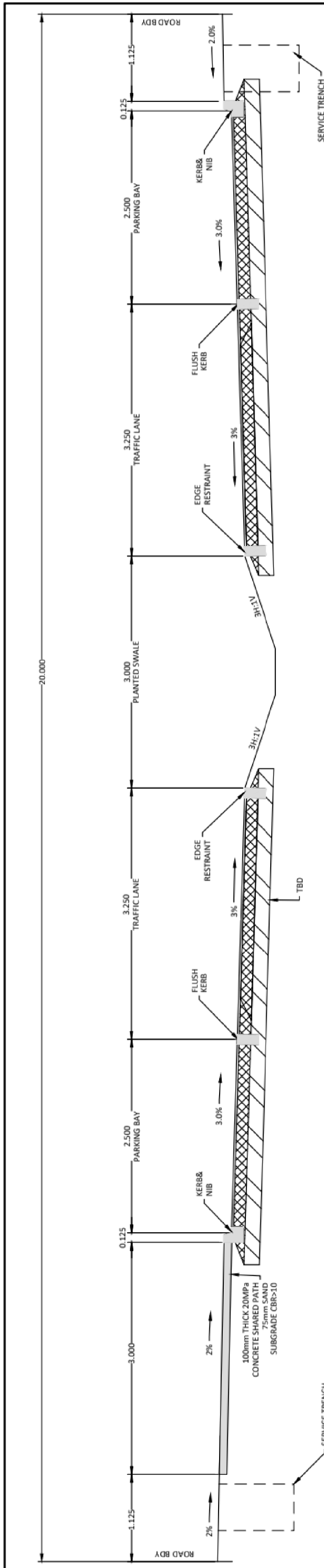

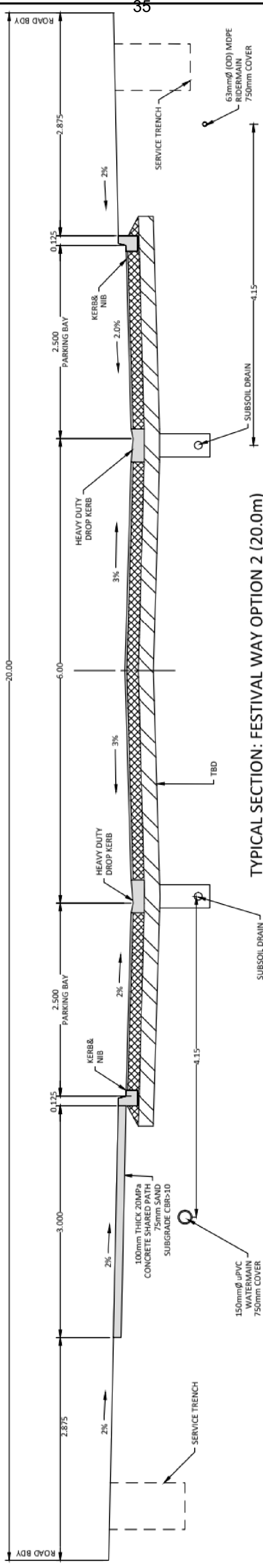
Attachment 1 – Schematic overview of IAF projects

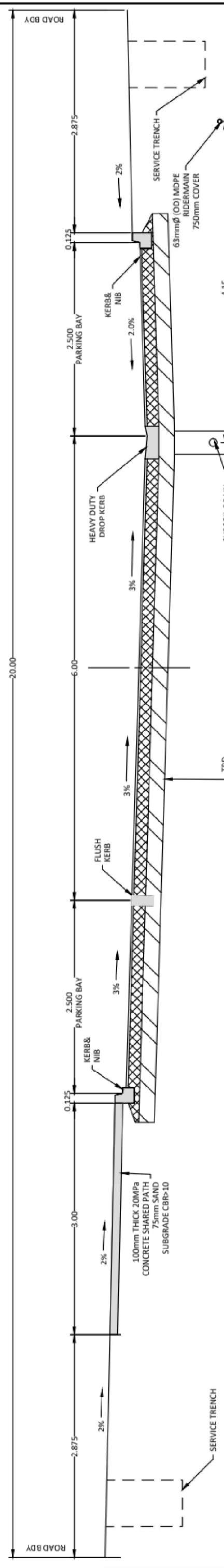




TYPICAL SECTION: FESTIVAL WAY OPTION 1 (20.0m)

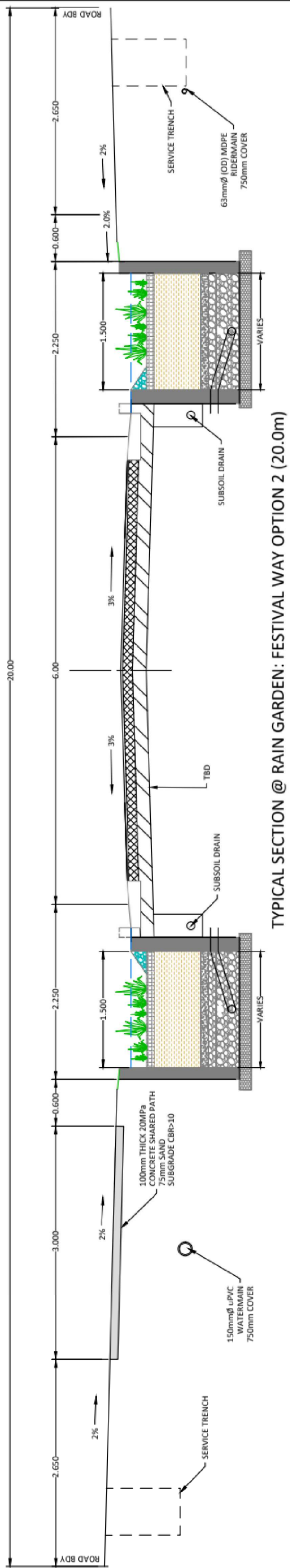

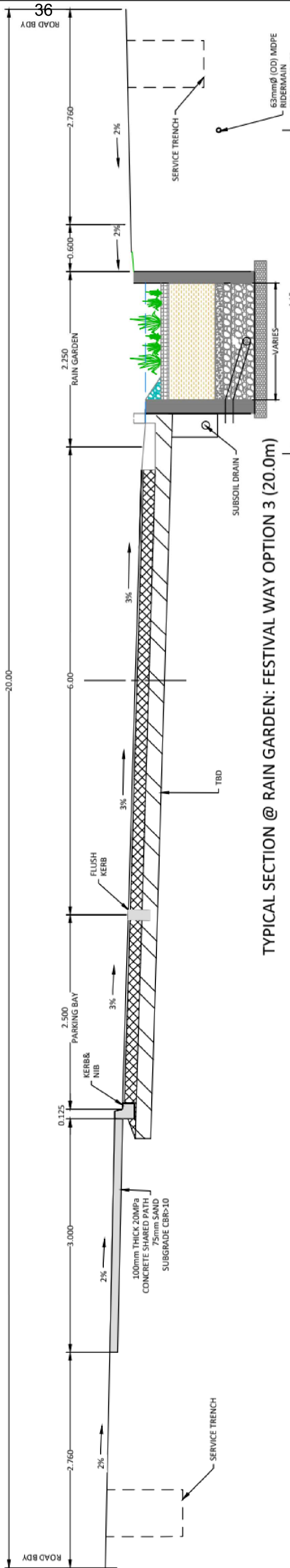
