Report Title | Huntly Community Facility

#### I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Council engaged GMD Consultants to undertake initial engagement with community groups across Huntly to understand their requirements and thoughts for any future community facility and to report back to the Huntly Community Board on the results of this engagement.

The initial engagement with community groups has been undertaken. A full summary of the discussions is attached. This information outlines the general feeling of the community towards existing community facilities, Council investment and potential options for Huntly Community Facilities in the future.

# 2. RECOMMENDATION

THAT the report from the Service Delivery General Manager be received;

AND THAT the Huntly Community Board supports the Huntly Community Board members being the working group to consider the feedback from the community;

AND FURTHER THAT the group report back to the Infrastructure Committee in June 2017 for consideration as part of the 2018-28 Long Term Plan.

#### 3. BACKGROUND

At the 13 September 2016 Council meeting staff reported on the community engagement undertaken in relation to the reports and community feedback on the Huntly Memorial Hall. The report proposed to further explore the future of the Huntly Memorial Hall through the formation of a community group to investigate the future facility needs of the Huntly

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community. As a result of the staff report, Council resolved to form a working group to explore the community facility needs of the wider Huntly community. The working group was required to report back to Council in time for the outcomes of any study to be considered as part of the 2018-2028 long term plan process (WDC 1609/07/3/2).

GMD Consultants were engaged to undertake the initial contact with community groups across Huntly to gain an understanding of their requirements and thoughts with regards to any future facility and to report back to the Huntly Community Board to progress.

This report outlines the results of the initial discussion and proposes a way forward.

# 4. **DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS OF OPTIONS**

# 4. I DISCUSSION

Following the GMD discussions, the feedback can be summarised as follows:

- Actual and perceived division between Huntly East and West. Community are very aware of the division on many levels, the community living to the West identify various instances where inequality of treatment is occurring. Of the opinion that any investment in facilities must occur in the West.
- Increased facilities at Lake Puketirini would benefit the community.
- Education facilities tend to be self-catering in terms of their requirements. On occasions the schools will use the town pool.
- The schools do identify the lack of an indoor facility that could cater for such activities as basketball and double as a large venue for productions and formal assemblies. Huntly College don't require such facilities as they have these on site.
- A reoccurring theme is that there is a lack of things to do for children and youth. Many are of the opinion that there is a correlation between this lack of options and the increasing anti-social behaviour in town.
- In general, there is a belief that Huntly has sufficient community facilities in the town, but there is a lack of coordination of these facilities and some require significant upgrade.
- Main Street needs work. Intimidating place to walk around, with both idle youth presence and a gang element regularly visible.
- The Memorial Hall triggers a divided response from the community. In general, the community see the Memorial Hall as a 'nice to have' but question the amount of use it was having and what potential users there would be if it was re built. Furthermore, the general response to repairing the hall is yes, but not at any cost, if it requires a large amount of money this would be better invested in a new facility or the updating of a currently utilised facility.
- Many responses were received to the point that the Memorial Hall 'hangs over the community' and is quite divisive. A decision on its future must be made.
- Some facilities and services in Huntly duplicate effort and 'compete' with each other.
- Consideration should be given to the aging community. A shortfall already exists for aged care facilities; this is likely to grow in the future.
- A lack of employment opportunities has resulted in a number of issues in Huntly.
- Some coordination of healthcare services and facilities would be a positive. Volunteer drivers have to duplicate effort around Huntly and into Hamilton.

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# 4.1.1 POTENTIAL PROJECTS OR ISSUES

With the above feedback in mind, the following is a summary of potential projects and/or issues for any working group to consider as part of their works:

- I. The development of a facility at Lake Puketirini to accommodate Waka Ama and other events.
- 2. Huntly Thistle Football Club is a growing club with Juniors through to Senior teams. Their facilities are woefully inadequate.
- 3. A decision to be made as to the future of the Huntly Memorial Hall.
- 4. An 'audit' of community facilities, as to the condition and the availability for hireage to other community groups.
- 5. A coordinated approach to the future of the main street. Huntly is not identified in the District Plan as requiring a structure plan but the community are keen to understand what the future of the town is once the Huntly Bypass is finished.

#### 4.2 OPTIONS

Following collation of the comments and issues from the community, there are two possible options moving forward.

**Option One:** Use the Huntly Community Board as the working group to workshop the feedback and report back to the Infrastructure Committee.

**Option Two:** Request the community groups whom have already been engaged with, to put forward representatives to be part of the working group to workshop the feedback and report back to the Infrastructure Committee. This process will take time.

The preferred option is Option One (to use the Huntly Community Board as the working

# 5.1 FINANCIAL

group).

The 2015-2025 LTP budget for the Memorial Hall in the 2016/17 year includes the following:

- \$113,775 for a toilet upgrade
- \$19,951 for capital renewal works
- \$4,428 for operational Repairs and Maintenance works.

These budgets are funded through the Huntly Halls Targeted Rate. The Council resolution WDC1609/07/3/2 stated that the funds be repurposed to cover interim maintenance costs and to support the formation of a working group.

All recommendations to the Infrastructure Committee will need to have funding requirements and options attached to them for consideration in the Long Term Plan process.

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#### 5.2 LEGAL

Depending on recommendations, there may be legal implications around use of land and/or facilities – these will be explored as part of the working group brief.

# 5.3 STRATEGY, PLANS, POLICY AND PARTNERSHIP ALIGNMENT

Depending on recommendations, the working group will ensure alignment with relevant strategies, plans, policies and partnerships.

# 5.4 Assessment of Significance and Engagement Policy and of External Stakeholders

Council has involved the Community in the process to ensure concerns and aspirations are understood.

Council's Significance and Engagement Policy requires Council to consider the significance of the proposal and appropriate level of engagement. Factors to consider include that degree to which the issue will impact rating levels, community interest levels, relative increase in expenditure and proportion of people impacted.
